GENERAL INFORMATION

This catalog contains current information regarding admissions, requirements, regulations, fees, and offered courses. Frontier School of the Bible reserves the right to withdraw a course, change tuition, room and board, and other fees, change the calendar and rules regarding admission and graduation requirements, and change any other regulations affecting the student body. Changes shall become effective whenever necessary and apply not only to prospective students but also to those who are enrolled in the school at that time.

Frontier School of the Bible has never applied for regional accreditation. We have chosen not to pursue accreditation for the following reasons:

- We believe it is important to maintain self-government in academic policies, social policies, financial policies, philosophy, doctrinal position, faculty issues, and board of director issues.
- We seek to keep expenses low so that more individuals can afford quality training for life and ministry. Accreditation creates a significant increase in costs.
- As a technical training institution, it is our desire to internally strive for and define excellence in education.
- In our experience, the vast majority of ministry-oriented organizations are mainly concerned with the spiritual life and firm grasp of the Scriptures on the part of the graduate.
- For graduates needing further education in fields FSB does not provide, various Christian colleges and universities accept our credits.

It is the practice of Frontier School of the Bible, and other institutes and colleges, to accept or reject credits based on their own institutional criteria regardless of whether or not the particular school transferring credit is accredited. If a student desires to transfer to another institution at any point in time, it is the student's responsibility to confirm whether or not credits will be accepted by another college of the student's choice.

Frontier School of the Bible is a Bible Institute and not a liberal arts college. As a technical school, it is designed to give the student a high quality Bible college/seminary type education to equip them for life and ministry. Its program is intended to be an end in itself and not a stepping stone to graduate school.

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While every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the information and listings contained herein, Frontier School of the Bible and the catalog writers assume no liability for errors or omissions. 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OUR BACKGROUND

HISTORICAL SKETCH

On September 5, 1967, Frontier School of the Bible opened its doors for the first time! The co-founders, Rev. Richard LeBar and Rev. Dan Johnson, had a burden for a school in the state of Wyoming which would be strictly a Bible Institute. They had a vision for what the Lord could do in and through such a training center, with strong emphasis on the Word of God. This purpose continues today.

The campus includes a dining hall and kitchen, classroom buildings, bookstore, student center, chapel, and administration building, which houses Frontier's library and offices. For housing, the school has several dormitories, apartment buildings for married students, guest accommodations, and several houses for staff and married students.

LOCATION

Frontier School of the Bible is situated in the heart of LaGrange, Wyoming, a cattle town along the old Texas Trail. With a population of around 300, this friendly rural town lies in the southeast corner of Goshen County. LaGrange provides FSB students with a place to get away from many of the distractions of the world and to focus on the Lord in a safe and peaceful place.

The county seat, Torrington, is 35 miles to the north while the state capital, Cheyenne, is located about 55 miles southwest. Scottsbluff, Nebraska, is within easy driving distance, and Denver, Colorado, is 150 miles south.

PURPOSE

Frontier School of the Bible exists to train students for life and ministry. It is the aim of Frontier to provide the student with accurate instruction in the Word of God, an academic environment compatible with gaining a thorough knowledge of the Word of God, a social atmosphere that encourages spiritual growth, and the opportunity for Christian service.

PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION

Our approach to education at FSB centers on the study of the Bible. We place emphasis on spiritual life and stress the practical training of the student in Christian service. Rather than focusing on philosophy, criticism, and studies about the Bible, attention is centered on study of the Bible itself. This study coupled with the opportunity to put these truths to work in personal witnessing and in spiritual growth, is designed to produce an evangelistic and missionary spirit as well as an attitude of submission to the Lord. We believe that only God, through knowledge of the Scriptures and submission to the indwelling Holy Spirit, can equip a person for the work He wants them to do. Our three-year program is designed to fully prepare an individual for ministry.

PRINCIPLES OF OPERATION

Frontier is a faith-based school, dependent solely on God and the prayerful interest of His own people who envision eternal dividends through investing in the lives of men and women given over to His purposes. Our policy is one of providing full information without solicitation (2 Cor. 9:6-7). Faculty and staff members are dependent upon God for their personal needs.

Frontier School of the Bible is organizationally independent. It is not endowed nor supported by any denomination, institution, or organization. Frontier stands for that which exalts Jesus Christ and against that which encourages the carnal nature.

DOCTRINAL STATEMENT

- We believe the Bible is the Word of God, supernaturally revealed and without error in its original documents, and is the supreme, final authority in faith and life.

- We believe in one God, eternally existing in three persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, co-equal in power and glory, identical in their essential nature, and worthy of precisely the same honor, confidence, obedience and love.

- We believe Jesus Christ was virgin-born, that He is both true God and true Man, that He died a sacrificial death for our sins and rose bodily from the dead.

- We believe man was created innocent, but in sinning he brought spiritual and physical death to himself and all his descendants. We believe the only condition for receiving everlasting life is faith alone in the Lord Jesus Christ, who died a substitutionary death on the cross for the sins of the whole world and rose bodily from the grave. No act of obedience, such as commitment to obey, sorrow for sin, turning from one's sin, baptism or submission to the Lordship of Christ, may be added to, or considered part of faith as a condition for receiving eternal life. This saving transaction between God and the sinner is simply the giving and receiving of a free gift.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

1. Applicants must give evidence of having received Jesus Christ as their personal Savior from sin and of maintaining a consistent walk which glorifies God. A written testimony must be submitted with the application, and cover the following areas of life:
 - Salvation
 - Surrender to God's will
 - God's leading up to the present
2. Applicants are asked to submit the names and contact information of three persons who are qualified to give reference as to life and conduct.
3. Applicants must submit an official transcript of high school and/or college credits. A high school diploma, G.E.D., or equivalent is required. However, we will prayerfully consider each person who desires training.
4. Applicants are requested to submit a recent photo of themselves.
5. A non-refundable \$25.00 application fee must accompany each application before it can be processed. Applications should be submitted as early as possible to allow time for processing. The application process will take at least one week from the time all paperwork listed above is received by the Admissions Department. A representative from admissions will contact the applicant when he or she is accepted. The deadline for applying for the fall semester is July 20. The deadline for applying for the spring semester is December 1. No applications will be accepted after those dates for that semester.
6. Applicants must understand that the teaching of instructors will be according to the doctrinal statement of the school, and students are not permitted to propagate any doctrinal views that conflict with the doctrinal statement of the school.
7. Applicants must agree to cooperate willingly with standards of life and work at Frontier and to keep current financially.
8. Applicants who are not willing to cooperate in maintaining the standards of Frontier School of the Bible will be invited to withdraw whenever the general welfare of the school demands it, even though there may not be any major or specific breach of conduct.
9. Frontier School of the Bible is free from any denominational ties whatsoever. We welcome any and all students who meet the requirements listed above.

ADMISSION POLICY

Frontier School of the Bible admits students of any race, color, national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students of the school. We do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national and ethnic origin in administration of our educational policies, admission policies, and school-administered programs. All applicants need to turn at least 17 within the first month of attendance. All full-time freshmen are required to stay in the dorms unless they are living with family or they have established residency in the area (there may be an exception for older students). Part-time students must establish residency or live in the area with family (there may be an exception for older students). All individuals who accept Frontier's doctrinal position and standards are welcome to apply.

COURSE OF STUDY

We offer only one major – BIBLE! Specialized areas of study include General Bible, Missions, Pastoral Ministry, Women’s Ministries, and Youth Ministry. The course prescribed for a first year student will give a good foundation to any Christian regardless of future vocation. Our three-year Associate of Arts degree program is designed to prepare the student for Christian ministry upon graduation. See the Graduation Requirements section for information about our Bachelor of Arts degree.

HOMESCHOOL STUDENTS

Applicant may submit a transcript from an official homeschool educational association, GED, or ACT test scores in lieu of a transcript. If the applicant does not have these items, the following is required:

- A homeschool transcript with a course description, the number of academic units completed, and the student’s total GPA.
- A two-page, double-spaced essay by the student, typed or printed by computer, with the subject, “My Homeschool Experience.”

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

This school is authorized under Federal Law to enroll nonimmigrant students.

In addition to the requirements of the application process, the following steps must be taken:

1. Proof of Funds – International applicants must submit to Frontier a statement from their bank or a letter from the person intending to pay for their schooling, proving the financial requirement will be met for the enrollment period at FSB. The international student must also prove to the US Consul that sufficient funds are accessible to undertake a program of study and must show ties to their home country with plans to return when studies are completed.
2. TOEFL – (Test of English as a Foreign Language) Non-English speaking applicants will be required to take the TOEFL. You can find more information about this at <http://www.toefl.org>.
3. I-20 Form – When the applicant has been accepted and the Proof of Funds letter is received, an I-20 form will be sent to the student. The I-20 form is required so the student may enter the United States using an F-1 Visa.
4. I-901 Payment – Payment of this fee is required before the student meets with the American Consul.
5. Meet with the American Consul – When the student receives the I-20 form, he/she must make an appointment at the American Embassy for an interview with the Consul. The student must take the following paperwork with him/her to the Embassy for inspection:
 - a. I-20 Form
 - b. Financial documents/Proof of Funds
 - c. Valid Passport
 - d. Proof of payment of I-901 fee
6. Student Visa – When the student is approved, an F-1 Visa will be granted which will be used to enter the USA. The student is responsible for maintaining legal F-1 status. The F-1 student visa will not allow the student off-campus employment while in the USA; therefore, sufficient funds must be procured in advance (or there must be planned regular financial support) for study in the USA at Frontier School of the Bible.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

Frontier may accept transfer credits from other institutions. We will allow credit for courses that are currently being taught or have been taught in the past at Frontier and for which a grade of C or higher has been earned. Full time FSB students may not take an online course during the school year for a transfer credit, if it is currently offered at FSB.

In order to graduate from Frontier, the student must spend a minimum of one academic year at this school and complete, with passing grades, a minimum of 32 classroom hours.

Doctrine and Theology classes should be completed at FSB rather than transferring credits in for those classes.

POLICIES ON CHANGES TO CLASS SCHEDULES

1. In order to add or drop a class, permission must be received from the registrar, who will consult with the instructors involved. If a class is dropped within the first two weeks of a semester, no grade will be recorded.
1. If a class is dropped after the first two weeks of a semester, a grade of WP (withdrew passing) or WF (withdrew failing) will be entered.
2. Under ordinary circumstances, a student may not drop a class after eight weeks. A grade of WN (withdrawal no grade) may be entered for a student who must withdraw from school due to extenuating circumstances.
3. No student will be permitted to add a class after the first week.
4. A student who enrolls late for any course will be counted absent for each class session of that course from the beginning of the semester.

AUDITING A CLASS

1. No credit is given for an audit class.
2. No homework or tests need to be completed for an audit class. Attendance is the only requirement.
3. An audit class does not affect grade point average.
4. The fee for an audit is half the price of a regular class taken for credit.

5. In an audit class, a student may have absences that equal twice the number of credits, plus one (a two-credit class is allowed five absences for an audit).
6. If there are more than the allowed number of absences, the student will be given the grade WA (withdraw audit) on their grade card. Again, this will not affect GPA.
7. If a student wants to attend class "occasionally," he shouldn't audit, rather he should talk to the teacher about sitting in on the class from time to time.

RECORDS

A complete transcript of all credits earned is kept on file in the Registrar's office and is available to each student. All academic records are confidential and will not be released without the student's written permission.

A student may request his or her transcript by submitting a signed and dated request to the registrar's office. The first transcript will be furnished without charge; thereafter, a charge of \$10.00 will be made to the student for each transcript issued. No transcript will be issued until all academic, financial, and other obligations to Frontier have been met.

RE-ADMISSION APPLICATION

An applicant that has previously attended FSB and has been gone from FSB for more than one academic year must re-submit the application requirements as well as answer the following questions.

1. When did you previously attend FSB and what were your reasons for leaving?
2. Tell us what has transpired in your life since you last attended FSB. Include information regarding employment, church attendance and activities, spiritual growth, and/or struggles, etc.
3. Why do you wish to return to FSB?

Note: Re-submission of transcripts is not required. If applicant attended another school *after* his/her time at FSB, those transcripts must be submitted.

REQUIREMENTS FOR EARNING A ONE-YEAR CERTIFICATE OF BIBLICAL EDUCATION

- o The student who completes the prescribed first year course of study with a 2.0 GPA or above will receive a Certificate of Completion.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ASSOCIATE OF ARTS DEGREE

1. Every student will be expected to follow the prescribed sequence of classes leading to their Associate of Arts degree.
2. The student shall have earned passing grades in all required classes.
3. The student shall have earned a minimum of 106 total hours for which credit is given. This will include classroom hours, Special Lectures, and Christian Service.
4. The student shall sign a statement that he/she is in agreement with the Frontier School of the Bible doctrinal statement.
5. The student shall give evidence of an approved Christian character. This is shown in interaction with other believers and faithfulness in ministry.
6. The student shall show a fitness and desire for serving the Lord. This is shown in an attitude of service and faithfulness in work detail.
7. The student shall have a cumulative grade point average for his/her time at Frontier of 2.0 or higher.

8. A transfer student shall spend a minimum of one academic year at Frontier, during which a minimum of 32 classroom hours must be completed with passing grades.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR BACHELOR OF ARTS DEGREE

- Students may earn a Bachelor of Arts degree through satisfactory completion of one of the following methods after earning an Associate of Arts Degree from Frontier.
 - An approved fourth-year internship
 - One year of language school
 - Two years of documented full-time ministry
 - A previously earned degree

FOURTH-YEAR INTERNSHIP REQUIREMENTS

The following are the requirements to successfully complete Frontier School of the Bible's Fourth-year Internship Program:

1. The intern shall complete the Internship Application with the approval of the assigned FSB faculty advisor and pay the initial \$100.00 Internship Fee.
2. The intern shall have his/her school bill paid in full before the Internship begins. (On-campus interns shall also have all other Internship fees paid in full before the Internship begins.)
3. The intern shall fulfill all the basic Internship requirements.
4. The intern shall sign a statement that he/she is in agreement with the Frontier School of the Bible doctrinal statement.
5. The intern shall receive a recommendation for graduation from the Internship Program from the on-site Internship Supervisor.

MARRIED LADIES' ACADEMICS

We believe it is critical for the wives of married students to receive some Bible training for ministry preparation. For this reason, we strongly recommend wives take up to five credit hours per semester. Spouses can take up to five credit hours at no charge if their spouse is taking 12 or more credit hours.

APPLICATION DEADLINE

The deadline to apply for the fall semester is July 20 and for the spring semester, December 1. No applications will be accepted after those dates for the semester.

*To receive the discount, the student account must be paid in full 2 weeks prior to registration.

^One-time Room Fee received *before* July 1 for fall semester or December 1 for spring semester will receive a \$50 discount.

For purposes of fee assessment, 12-22 credit hours shall be considered full-time and the tuition figure shown above shall apply. Students taking more than 20 *classroom* hours will be charged an additional fee for the extra credits. Only full-time students will be allowed to live in the dorms and school housing. For those who take less than 12 hours, the fee shall be \$100.00 per credit hour to take classes for credit. The fee for auditing classes shall be \$50.00 per audited credit hour. Students must pay for their own books and materials. Late registration is \$50.00. If a student requires "single occupancy," an additional \$50-\$150 will be added per semester upon fulfillment of request.

Wives of full-time students may take up to 5 hours of classes (credit or audit) without tuition charge, and they may take any number of hours at a 50% reduction of tuition or audit fees. Children of full-time students who live at home receive a 50% reduction of tuition or audit fees.

Off-Campus and/or Married Students must pay \$1,350.00 (\$1050 tuition + \$300 fees) for the semester. A discount of \$100 will be given (\$1,250.00) if paid in full by August 1 for fall semester and December 15 for spring semester. Books are not included in this price. There may be additional charges for the non-student spouses, billed as necessary.

Frontier School of the Bible does not provide a 1098-T form for tax purposes.

FINANCIAL REGULATIONS

For new students, total payment is due at registration (tuition, room, board, books, and fees). Financing options may be available for upperclassmen; please see the business office. All payments to FSB must be made in cash (US dollars), by check, or through the FSB website (click on "Support Frontier" to pay by credit card or to set up an ACH [Automated Clearing House electronic funds transfer]). Foreign students must pay with check or money order drawn on a U.S. bank. A bill will be emailed to all students for convenience.

If at any time a student is behind in his/her bill, he may be asked to give a reason for the delinquency and to declare his intentions concerning payment. If said intentions are not satisfactory, the student may expect to be asked to leave school.

No transcript or diploma will be issued until all academic, financial, and other obligations to Frontier have been met.

REFUNDS

If a student leaves school, the following schedule of refunds for the tuition and board charges shall be put into operation at the discretion of the Business Manager:

DOCTRINE

DOC 101	Doctrine 1	CREDITS: 3
An introductory study of the fundamental doctrines of the Christian faith, acquainting the student with the major themes of Biblical truth: God, Scripture, Angels, Man, Sin, and Salvation.		

DOC 102	Doctrine 2	CREDITS: 3
A continuation of the study of the fundamental doctrines of the Christian faith, covering Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the Church, and things to come.		

DOC 201	Theology 1	CREDITS: 3
An introduction to the study of Theology. Focus is given to the consideration of the doctrine of the Bible and the Person of God, including His nature, attributes, relationship with man, and the like. <i>Prerequisites: DOC 101 & 102</i>		

DOC 202	Theology 2	CREDITS: 3
The study of the existence and work of angels, the creation and nature of humanity, the fall and sin of humanity, and the salvation God accomplishes through Jesus. <i>Prerequisite: DOC 201</i>		

DOC 301	Theology 3	CREDITS: 3
The study of the Church as both an organism and an organization. Much emphasis is placed on the practical theology of the Church. <i>Prerequisite: DOC 202</i>		

DOC 302	Theology 4	CREDITS: 3
The study of the doctrine of the Second Coming of Christ and all its related events, such as the Rapture, Tribulation, judgments, resurrections, Millennium, and closing stages of God's dealings. <i>Prerequisite: DOC 301</i>		

DOC 305 & 305B	Senior Project	CREDITS: 1 EACH SEMESTER
Students will be required to write a doctrinal statement, construct a personal resume, and pass a comprehensive theology exam that covers all the areas of Systematic Theology. The exam will be given in six parts over a six-week period.

An expositional study of the book of Genesis beginning with the literal seven days of Creation, and including the Fall of Man, the Noahic flood, the Abrahamic covenant, the inception of the Jewish Nation, and how these things relate to the rest of Scripture.		
BIB 114	Gospel of John	CREDITS: 2
An exposition and study of the Gospel of John. Particular attention will be given to John's emphasis on the person of Christ and the contemporary application of the text.		
BIB 118	1&2 Thessalonians	CREDITS: 2
An exposition of Paul's two letters to the church of the Thessalonians. These two epistles contain much teaching on how to practically strive for excellence in the Christian life in light of rapture and Christ's second coming.		
BIB 119	Life of David	CREDITS: 2
A study of the life and career of the second king of Israel. This course will consider the historical account of David's life as well as take into account practical devotional lessons with the purpose of understanding what it means to be a person after God's own heart.		
BIB 211	Acts	CREDITS: 2
An analytical study of Acts. Acts covers the time of transition from Israel to the Church. Special problems dealing with the interpretation of Acts will be considered. Lessons relating to local church principles and missionary ministry will also be noted.		
BIB 212	Exodus & Leviticus	CREDITS: 2
A study of God's deliverance of the nation of Israel from the bondage of Egypt, the giving of the Law, and of God's expectation of the nation of Israel for holy living.		
BIB 213	Daniel	CREDITS: 2
An expository study of the book of Daniel. Special emphasis will be placed upon the extraordinary life of Daniel who provides many practical examples of what it means to live a life set apart unto the Lord. Attention will also be given to the intricate prophecies declared to and through this prophet in exile, so that the student may have a better overall understanding of the prophetic timeline revealed in Scripture.		
BIB 214	Hebrews	CREDITS: 2
An expository study of the book of Hebrews giving special attention to the superiority of Christ.		
BIB 215	Minor Prophets	CREDITS: 2
A survey of the last twelve books of the Old Testament. While the class will consider major themes common to their prophetic message, expositional study will be focused on a select few.		
BIB 218	Matthew	CREDITS: 2
The aim of this study is to bring the student to an understanding of the historical, theological, and practical importance of the first Gospel. Special attention will be given to the teachings and events that are unique to Matthew.		
BIB 219	Judges	CREDITS: 1
An exposition of the book of Judges showing the repeated failure of the nation of Israel to obey God and the consequences they suffered. Special attention will be given to both the meaning of the text for the ancient Israelite and the application of the text to the modern believer.		

BIB 220	1 Corinthians	CREDITS: 2
A verse-by-verse study of Paul's first epistle to the church in Corinth. The goal of this course is that each student will have an understanding of the important teachings contained therein, both in a theological sense as well as in a practical sense to be lived out today.		
BIB 310	Ezekiel	CREDITS: 2
An expository study of the book written by the prophet to the exiles with an emphasis on the unique ministry of Ezekiel. Special attention will be given to connect Ezekiel's visions and messages with the rest of the Biblical & prophetic timeline.		
BIB 312	Revelation	CREDITS: 2
An analytical study of the book of Revelation, giving attention to the dispensational aspects of this book. Revelation is the study of future things as God has revealed them to man.		
BIB 313	Psalms	CREDITS: 2
This course covers the history, background, and methods of studying the Psalms. An expositional study is also done on select Psalms.		
BIB 315	Romans	CREDITS: 2
The book of Romans is a challenging book of Biblical doctrine coupled with practical Christian living. Our purpose in studying it is to give students a clear understanding of this book and how it relates to them.

<p>A study of the call and qualifications of the pastor. As well as the establishing of a Biblical philosophy of ministry.</p>

STUDENT LIFE

GENERAL INFORMATION

Many students find life in LaGrange a little different from anything they have previously experienced. It is a small town (about 300 people) situated on the open plains. You will find it to be a great frontier experience.

For recreation in LaGrange, you can enjoy disc golf, a paved walking path, and biking. Cross country skiing and tubing are available in the winter (downhill skiing is about 2.5 hours away). Fishing, hunting, hiking, and canoeing are available during fall and spring. We are within driving distance of several national parks.

The cities of Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and Cheyenne, and Torrington, Wyoming are 40-55 minutes away.

The student handbook has information on such things as dress code, dorm regulations, etc.

DEVOTIONAL TIME

Development of the spiritual life is an integral part of training at Frontier School of the Bible. Classroom instruction will never take the place of a personal time of fellowship with the Lord.

There will be times of planned prayer and fellowship together, and we also encourage spontaneous times of praise and intercession within the student body.

Chapel services are held daily, giving opportunity for expression in praise, song, and sharing. Faculty members, students, missionaries, and pastors present a challenge from the Word during these services.

A missionary conference is held for a week during one semester; and a one week-long Special Lecture is conducted by a visiting instructor during each semester.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE

A practical application of Christian principles is necessary to develop the life and maturity of any student. Therefore, Christian Service will be assigned, involving both individual and group activity. It may be teaching a Sunday school class, giving a testimony, working with children, AWANA participation, singing, leading a song service, evangelism, visitation, preaching, youth ministry, etc. The student will receive credit for acceptable completion of Christian service ministries.

In order to develop school unity, individual responsibility, and Christian character, each dorm student is asked to do one hour of service in the dorm or around campus each week. Freshmen regularly help in the dining hall.

AMOOK (Advancing Missions on Our Knees) is an organization initiated by students for the purpose of encouraging interest in missions through prayer, distribution of current missions' information, involvement with missionaries, and the sponsorship of special meetings and projects. AMOOK sponsors prayer bands where students meet regularly to pray for and receive information from missionaries ministering in specific geographic locations.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

In addition to the Student Center which has a snack shop, game room, and common area, there are also a variety of social events planned each semester. Special dinners, themed socials, skating, gym nights,

intramurals (including softball, volleyball, basketball and dodgeball), bowling, mini golf and sporting events are just a few of the activities on the social calendar.
